Whereas,	Dr. Lila Miller is a groundbreaking veterinarian who has transformed the lives of countless pets, educated a generation of students and paved the way for women of color in veterinary medicine; and
Whereas,	a Harlem native, Dr. Miller became the first Black American woman to graduate from Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine in 1977, where she later taught the first-ever veterinary shelter medicine course; and
Whereas,	Dr. Miller was long a fixture of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, first serving as the director of the

- Brooklyn clinic for 15 years before transitioning to roles as veterinary advisor, vice president of veterinary outreach, and vice president of shelter medicine; and
- *Whereas,* Dr. Miller co-founded the Association of Shelter Veterinarians and developed the first veterinarian-written guidelines for shelter animal care which are now used nationwide ensuring humane treatment and preventative care; and
- *Whereas,* today we celebrate Dr. Lila Miller, Mother of Shelter Medicine, her trailblazing career and well-deserved 2021 Avanzino Leadership Award from Maddie's Fund for her leadership in shelter medicine
